(Sikh Salutation) "Vaheguru Ji Ka Khalsa, Vaheguru Ji Ki Fateh"

Hello everybody, my name is Prabhjot Singh Sambi, and I am a Biological Sciences major. I would like to start by thanking Dr. Ravinder Singh and Mrs. Kamaljeet Kaur Khaira, the College of Biological Sciences, and the Chancellor for allowing the Sikh Student Association to work with the university to get this event going!

Davis has been the land of agriculture since the 1900s. This land of Mother Earth was blessed more by the Sikh and Panjabi communities when they immigrated to the USA for work as Sikh and Panjabi communities back home in Panjab (Pakistan and India, both sides) had been the biggest agricultural sector for both countries. Panjabis did a lot in the agricultural sector, and they implemented those farming practices in Davis, too!

Munsha Singh was the first Punjabi and a farmer who settled in Davis in 1907. He was the right-hand man of the person, George Pierce Jr., who lobbied to build the University in Davis. A Sikh farmer was an essential part of the birth of the university.

Since the late 1900s, Punjabis and Sikhs have been an integral part of the community here in California and settled around the land of Davis. Some examples are Dr. Khush, who was the first person from Asia to be offered a faculty position at UC Davis in 1960. He played a key role in the development of rice variety in the Green Revolution and was given the UC Davis Medal in 2018. Narinder Singh Randhawa, who got his PhD at Davis, went on to head ICAR in India. Third, there's a wonderful professor at Davis named Paul Singh - he is a world-renowned food engineer who designed the meals for NASA's mission to Mars.

The community has increased over the years, and now, many students on campus represent the community.

As parents, they like to see their kids progress and find excellence in life; similarly, the community finds joy and pride when their people succeed and reach greatness. Today, the Sikh and Panjabi community has yet again painted a page in the history of the University of California to get a lecture hall named after the Sikhs and panjabis!

The regional community takes dignity and pride in this moment, and this will be remembered through generations! Some members of the community from Davis, Woodland, and Sacramento are present here today with us! When we told them about this fortunate day, they were all very delighted, spirited, and thrilled.

Also, this is exemplary for all regional and minority communities as well. It tells everyone that UC Davis is a diverse and culturally inclusive place.
